## Finch Road update

$84^{\text {th }}$ Reading have an old building in Finch Road that is used to store all the equipment that is needed for camps and other events and activities. The building was originally a Scout hut used for weekly meetings, but as the group grew in size we outgrew the building and decided to use it for storage instead.

Over the last few months, our Property Maintenance Coordinator, lan Abbott, has been investigating various options for improving the site, as it is in much need for some maintenance and TLC. Over a weekend in July, some parents and Scout leaders helped clear a large area of the site, filling a skip with soil, rubble and green waste, which has made a big improvement and helps to get the site ready for the next stage of refurbishment.


The plan for the next few months is to replace the old asbestos roof and guttering, repair the brickwork and fit some new doors. Some of the plumbing also needs renewing, a new fence added and a concrete slab laid where the soil and rubble were removed. We then hope to repaint both outside and inside to tidy it up and get it ready for the winter months. This should give us a refreshed storage site that will last for many years to come.

The roof is due to be replaced in mid-November but there are lots of small jobs to be done before then and afterwards. If anyone would like to help with some of the painting, DIY jobs or occasional weeding, either as a one-off or something more regular, this would be much appreciated. ## SCOUTS

With Monday night Scouts running at capacity of 24 , our Scouts spent the summer term focusing most of their attention on the expedition challenge award. After beginning the term celebrating the King's coronation by making themed no-bake sweets, Scouts started learning all the skills and knowledge required to go on a successful expedition.

Map reading skills sessions ensured the Scouts knew how to navigate a route and understand how to go the right way, but also what to do if they go wrong.
This was followed by a night hike and orienteering course to put learnt skills into practise.

Trangia cooking taught the Scouts how to safely cook a meal on a compact stove and how sensible meal planning can mean you can take meals with you that have minimal weight to them.

Our bag packing session showed the Scouts that this can be sensibly done to carry everything, including your Trangia in your kit, whilst not being too heavy but still well organised so you can easily get to what you will likely need.

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A Radio scavenger hunt was a fun way for the scouts to learn how to correctly transmit and receive messages over radio, so that on an expedition, successful communication could be made between Scout teams and the leaders when help is required.

All the above, amongst other fun activities such as a visit to Coral Reef, team building games and a BBQ, all built up to our expedition to the new forest.
Scouts all met at a start point before being set off on their route of nearly 16 km . The expedition saw the Scouts safely trekking through the gorgeous countryside whilst carrying their kit, walking at their own pace and working well as teams to succeed at their task. One or two slight hiccups along the way such as learning compasses don't work when held next to a radio, so walking east when you think your walking south, did nothing to lower the spirits of the Scouts. With leaders spotting the error whilst tracking the Scouts, they were quickly put back on course to successfully complete the route and make it to Ferny Crofts to set up camp.

A well earnt evening meal and camp fire were greatly enjoyed before having a good nights sleep. Sunday then saw the Scouts use their Trangias once more to cook their morning porridge, before heading off for a fun day out at Beaulieu Motor Museum.

A huge well done to all those that came on the expedition, as well as all the Scouts and leaders for another successful term.

## Sea Scouts

Friday troop began the term by making and decorating sweets to celebrate the King's coronation and then spent the rest of the summer completing parts of their Outdoors and Adventure challenge awards. This included a treasure hunt around Earley (solving cryptic clues in teams), games in Sol Joel park and then eight weeks of water-sports such as raft-building, kayaking, canoeing and paddle-boarding.

In July, the troop went on a 5-day camp in Winchester. The scouts completed a 9 mile hike on the South Downs to practice their map-reading skills in teams. They also went paddleboarding in Southampton and then explored Winchester city centre - learning some local history via a themed (fictional) murder-mystery challenge. On the campsite, the Scouts did more outdoor activities such as tomahawk throwing, crate-stacking/climbing and played wide-games in the woods.


The Scouts also made their own meals using different cooking methods throughout the week: group cooking on hobs, patrol cooking on trangias and individual cooking on open fires, having first made the fires themselves. In addition, they participated in many team challenges and games (contributing towards an overarching camp-long patrol competition) and tried miniature pioneering using dowel rods. We are very grateful to Lisa for all her hard work in organising the Sea Scout camp (while Jane ran a separate Cub camp on the same site with different activities).
